As part of the new Strategic Plan, IGLYO identified three Key Thematic Areas for the first half of 2014 - 2018. These are:

- Intersectionality
- Social Inclusion

In 2016, IGLYO will ask the General Assembly to review and adopt updated Key Thematic Areas for the remainder of the Strategic Plan.

### Annual Work Plan

In addition to the Strategic Plan, the General Assembly in 2014 approved IGLYO's Work Plan 2015. This document gives information about the specific activities IGLYO planned to undertake in 2015 to achieve the strategic objectives of the organisation.

## G/ ACTIVITY REPORT

The following section list the activities undertaken since the General Assembly in Dublin in November 2014 and is organised according to the strategic objectives, with all activities following from that objective listed under the text. While some activities meet more than one objective, we have listed each activity in only one place. The strategic objectives serve to guide the Board and Secretariat in choosing activities that satisfy the Strategic Plan. They provide more detail as to the types of activities that the organisation should undertake.

### OBJECTIVE 1. To be the leading voice representing LGBTQ youth and students, contributing to progressive policy making on an international level.

#### EXTERNAL REPRESENTATIONS

##### Council of Europe Advisory Council on Youth

As the only specific human rights organisation elected to the Council of Europe Advisory Council on Youth, IGLYO plays an important part in making sure that human rights and the well-being of marginalized groups stays on the Council of Europe Youth Department agenda. IGLYO's Representative on the Council of Europe Advisory Council on Youth, Roh Petas, was elected Gender Equality Rapporteur of the Council of Europe Joint Council on Youth in 2014, and continued working in this area over 2015. In the Advisory Council, IGLYO's representative is responsible for the dossier on inclusion of young people with disabilities. Our representative also follows the No Hate Speech Movement (NHSM) and the Lanzarote Committee on Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse.

Furthermore in April 2015, Mina Tolu, was elected to the Advisory Council on Youth for the 2016-2017 mandate, and therefore IGLYO will continue to voice the concerns of LGBTQ youth and students at the Council of Europe.

**LGBT Leader's Conference, February 2015 (London, England)**

As the voice of the European LGBTQ youth and student community IGLYO was asked to attend the LGBT Leader's conference and speak as an expert on the topic of professional LGBT Networks. IGLYO was represented by Treasurer Joshua McCormick. The event lasted one day and saw an audience of LGBTQ graduates not normally involved in LGBTQ youth activism but who are usually involved in business, law and politics.

**International IDAHOT Forum on LGBT Rights, May 2015 (Budva, Montenegro)**

IGLYO attended the third IDAHOT Forum, and was represented by the then Co-Chair Eirik Rise, and Executive Coordinator Euan Platt. At the forum, besides participating in the conference program, IGLYO recorded fifteen interviews with government ministers, NGOS, and heads of European Institutions to gather their thoughts on the situation for LGBTQI youth. These videos can be watched on IGLYO's YouTube channel. IGLYO is proud to be supporting a youth side event at the next IDAHOT Forum which will be held in Copenhagen in May 2016 and will work with member organisations in the city to carry this out.

**Europride, June 2015 (Riga, Latvia)**

IGLYO was represented at Europride by Co-Chair Mina Tolu and Treasurer Joshua McCormick. Besides participating in the pride parade, where we encouraged local LGBTQ individuals to march, we also delivered a workshop on intersectionality which was attended by twenty activists at the pride house. We were also invited to talk at a training about LGBTQ campaigning organised by LYMEC.

**ILGA-Europe Annual Conference, October 2015 (Athens, Greece)**

IGLYO will be represented at ILGA-Europe's Annual Conference in October 2015 by Co-Chair Dani Prisacariu and Executive Coordinator Euan Platt. IGLYO will be delivering a workshop on intersectionality and leading an introductory session for youth delegates at the event. This new initiative was suggested by IGLYO and strongly welcomed by ILGA Europe as part of our joint commitment to increase youth participation.

**Have You Seen My Rights Coalition**

In 2015 IGLYO took part in Have You Seen My Rights-coalition which consists of 40+ youth organisations. The coalition is committed to ensuring our sexual health, rights and access to health services are effectively represented, supported and monitored in the SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals that will replace Millennium Development Goals from 2015 onwards). IGLYO ensured that the needs and concerns of LGBTQI youth are also raised in the work of coalition.

**European Youth Forum GA and COMEM**

IGLYO participated at the General Assembly of the European Youth Forum (YFJ) in November 2014. IGLYO was represented by Eirik Rise and Roh Petas. The General Assembly voted upon a Code of Conduct (CoC) in which making IGLYO have been instrumental. The CoC condemns all forms of discrimination within the YFJ platform and list concrete procedures for how to act when the code has been broken. The Assembly was held during Transgender Day Of Remembrance 20. November and IGLYO implemented a poster campaign that got high visibility in social media and where over 50 delegates participated, including board members, candidates and the then and current President of the Forum. The pictures were made into a video shown for all delegates at the GA during plenary.

Furthermore IGLYO participated in the European Youth Forum Committee of Members (COMEM) in Brussels in April 2015. IGLYO was represented by Mina Tolu and Roh Petas, who presented Mina's candidature for the future Advisory Council on Youth. Mina was elected to the council by European Youth Forum members during the COMEM. IGLYO will also be present at the next European Youth Forum COMEM in Madrid in November 2015, represented by Advocacy Officer Nitin Sood.



## Statements

IGLYO released the following statements and joint statements over 2015:

- Grave concern over recent attacks against Igbti people in turkey
- Joint appeal to the german federal government
- Rights of Igbti persons cannot be subject to compromise in EU`s relations with eastern neighbours
- Iglyo calls for an intersectional approach in gender equality fight
- Iglyo calls for stronger commitment to fighting discrimination on international holocaust remembrance day

IGLYO also took part in the public consultation of the European Union on equality between women and men in the EU. In the consultation we stressed the importance of moving towards non-binary gender policies and inclusion of transgender people to truly realise gender equality. Furthermore IGLYO also contributed to the preparation of the UN Secretary General's report to the General Assembly on "Protecting children from bullying", highlighting the issues that particular LGBTQI youth experience at schools.

IGLYO has been involved in lobbying the Horizontal Directive that would forbid discrimination based on religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation in access to goods and services, access to education and social benefits in the European Union. IGLYO has met several times relevant partners to guarantee the advancement of the directive and submitted real case studies to the Commissioner about bullying that LGBTQ students experience in education.

Furthermore IGLYO, together with several other INGOs sent out a joint statement for the EPSCO council meeting the 11th of December 2014 where ministers of employment and social affairs met to discuss the adoption of the horizontal anti-discrimination directive on ministerial level. The statement urges all EU governments to show unanimous leadership and adopt a strong anti-discrimination Directive protecting all people in their daily lives as soon as possible.

IGLYO has been working also on lobbying a comprehensive multi-annual LGBT policy approach at EU level (also known as EU LGBTI roadmap). We have attended meeting in order to ensure that the policy would take into account the discrimination that particularly LGBTIQ youth experience.

## UNESCO Consultative Partnership Application

Early in the summer 2015 IGLYO applied to become a consultative partner in UNESCO. If successful this will allow IGLYO to have more sustained co-operation with UNESCO,

## MEETINGS

### **Project Co-ordination Meetings**

Four Project Coordination Meetings (Board Meetings) organised to coordinate the work of the board and secretariat in planning of conferences, events, and more. Meetings held in:

### **Financial Control Committee, May 2015 (Brussels, Belgium)**

The Financial Control Committee (FCC) then consisting of Josh McCormick, Karoline Börner and Setta María met from the 10th to the 12th of July 2015 and carried out an independent assessment of the financial books for 2014. The FCC Report will also be presented as part of the General Assembly.

### **Funding Meeting with the Dutch Ministry, October 2015 (Den Haag, Netherlands)**

In October Co Chair, Dani Prisacariu, and Executive Co-ordinator, Euan Platt, attended a meeting with the Dutch Ministry to present our Annual Progress Report and the plan for the year ahead. They also meet the new Director of Gender and LGBT Equality, Jacqueline Prins.

## CONFERENCES & EVENTS

### **Capacity Building Seminar: Organisational Development, April 2015 (Brussels, Belgium)**

Between 18th and 19th of April, IGLYO organised a capacity building seminar particularly aimed at member organisations who have been running for three years or less or are still at an early stage of development. The seminar has provided participants with diverse knowledge and skills to assist their organizations in their internal development: planning, managing and evaluating its projects and activities better, increasing its effectiveness in communications, building a strong and coherent image of the organization among its structures: staff, leadership, members, clients, gaining exposure to theory and evidence-based approaches.

### **Positive Steps Beyond Norm Criticism Conference, May 2015 (Stockholm, Sweden)**

The norm criticism conference was a five day event where we brought together 40 different people from all over Europe. The conference was aimed around introducing activists to what norm criticism is and how to use norm critical approaches in practice. Throughout the five days we looked into different activities and themes, including intersectionality, regional realities and action planning. In the end, participants were very positive that they had gained something from this event. As a result of this event, a task force was created to create both a position paper and a toolkit on norm criticism.

### **Capacity Building Seminar: Intersex Activism, July 2015 (Berlin, Germany)**

Between 3rd and 5th of July, IGLYO and ILGA-Europe gathered 18 LGBTQ activists from all over Europe for a capacity building seminar on LGBTQ activism and intersex. The seminar provided the participants with diverse knowledge, skills and attitudes to build alliances with intersex people and organisations, and develop initiatives that support them more effectively. Experts from OII Europe (Organisation Intersex International Europe) were co-facilitating the seminar.

**Pestalozzi Training: LGBTQI Inclusive Sexual Education, October 2015 (Oslo, Norway)**

Late 2014 IGLYO was successful in applying to hold a European teacher training workshop under the Council of Europe's "Pestalozzi"-programme. IGLYO was represented by Eirik Rise, George Charonis and Euan Platt. The workshop was held in Oslo from the 12th to the 14th of October 2015 in cooperation with the University College of Applied Sciences in Oslo and Akershus, Queer Youth Norway, the European Wergeland Centre and the Norwegian LGBT association. 18 teachers and teacher trainers from 12 European countries were introduced to and developed their own tools for inclusive sexual education in order to teach young people about sexuality, gender and anti-discrimination. Using participatory methods developed by the Pestalozzi programme as well as IGLYO's resources and best practices of member organisations, such as norm criticism and including gender perspectives, participants shared experiences and developed transversal skills, attitudes and knowledges adopted to their educational contexts.

**Study Session on LGBTQ Youth & Homelessness, October 2015 (Budapest, Hungary)**

At the end of October IGLYO is organising in partnership with European Federation of National Organisations Working with the Homeless (FEANTSA) the study session called "DOWN & OUT: Social Exclusion of LGBTQ Young People and Homelessness".

The aim of the study session is to equip participants with knowledge, skills and tools to address the risks and consequences of homelessness and lower socioeconomic status affecting LGBTQ youth.

**Annual Member Conference, November 2015 (Bucharest, Romania)**

The Annual Members Conference (General Assembly) will take place from the 13-15 November 2015 in Bucharest, Romania. On the 12 November 2015 IGLYO offers an additional one-day event for AMC delegates, exploring LGBTQI activism in Eastern Europe. IGLYO's Annual Members' Conference is the most important event for members to attend as it involves voting on the direction and structure of the organisation. This year decisions will include: electing new board members, electing new FCC members, approving the work plan and budget for 2016, updating the statutes & internal regulations, discussing Position Papers on Intersectionality & Norm Criticism.

**OTHER PARTICIPATION OPPORTUNITIES****GA Taskforce**

Following IGLYO's 2014 General Assembly a task force was set up by the Board with the mandate to revise and suggest for the General Assembly changes to the IGLYO statutes and General Assembly Regulations. The call for the task force was announced in May and three people were selected for the task force, Kimon Panagiotopoulos from Colour Youth, Greece, Fran Cowling from National Union of Students, UK and Luisa Tolu from We are, Malta. The task force was led by Board Member and secretary Eirik Rise. From June - September 2015 the task force held three online meetings resulting in several recommendations to the Board to be submitted for the General Assembly. A final draft was submitted and approved by the Board at an online meeting on the 27th of September.

**Norm Criticism Taskforce**

The norm criticism task force was created in August to provide a meaningful participation of LGBTQI young people in the working structures of IGLYO. A call was sent out for task force members and in total 4 people were accepted on the task force along with 1 board member and 1 staff member. The task force was in charge of creating a position paper on norm criticism and a toolkit. Their work has gone well and the results are a finished position paper and a toolkit that is now being designed by our designers, with all material finished.

**RESOURCES****Intersectionality Toolkit**

In the summer of 2014 IGLYO organised 4 roundtables on intersectionality focused on gender, race and ethnicity, (dis)abilities and socio-economic status. Each roundtable had one rapporteur, and gathered people from various organisations that were relevant for each of the topic we tackled. After the 4 roundtables, a final meeting of the rapporteurs was held and then we began producing IGLYO's position paper on intersectionality and the toolkit. The Intersectionality toolkit includes practical advices on how to make your organisation more intersectional, but also gives background to the way that IGLYO has been dealing with this topic in its work.

**Guidelines for Inclusive Education**

IGLYO has a long working history in the field of education and has always innovated this field by bringing forward the opinions and needs of young people. The Guidelines for Inclusive Education have been released first in 2006 and now, in 2015, we are releasing the second version, updated and with new perspectives added in. The second version is a joint effort of IGLYO with its partner OBESSU and has been developed starting from the first guidelines by 35 young people from both organisations who gathered for a study session in Budapest in 2014, called Standing together: action and advocacy against bullying.

**Teachers' Guidelines for Inclusive Education**

To complement the updated Inclusive Guidelines for Education, IGLYO has developed a new resource, specifically focusing on teachers, with a range of advice, guidance and practical activities to promote inclusion through their teaching.

**Norm Criticism Toolkit**

The Norm Criticism Toolkit was developed by the Taskforce created in the summer of 2015 following an intense conference on the same topic. All participants at the conference had the chance to input on the content and strategy of the toolkit and then the taskforce developed their ideas and put them in a final form. The toolkit gives an insight into this innovative method and gives participants the critical tools needed to create changes in their organisations and in their activism.

**Norm Criticism Position Paper**

Developing a position paper on Norm Criticism, and Intersectionality. The Intersectionality paper was voted upon during the General Assembly in 2014, but recommendations were added in 2015. The Norm Criticism paper was developed by the Norm Criticism task force in the third quarter of 2015, and will be presented to the General Assembly in November 2015.

**Intersectionality Research**

IGLYO released a call for research in the second quarter of 2015. A researcher was selected and is working on finding best practices of including intersectional identities in our member organisations. A minimum of three member organisations will take part in in-depth interviews and observations to highlight best practices in intersectional work. The research will be released in early 2016.

**MEMBERSHIP****New Membership Portal (Wild Apricot)**

In 2015 IGLYO has developed the way it works with its membership using launching a new online Membership Portal. This not only helps to keep good evidence of all members but also contributed to a better collection of membership fees. The system also gives members the possibility of keeping track of their status as a member of IGLYO and easily register for events such as the Annual Members Conference in a private and safe way.

**Regional Portfolios**

In 2015 IGLYO`s board has worked to get closer to its members by dividing the membership into a portfolio for each board member. This has been an ongoing process that the board has been developing and that has facilitated a better insight into our membership; this way we could identify inactive members, but also be an interface to IGLYO in case members had questions regarding the activity of the organisation. Since each board member had 10 to 15 member in their portfolio we managed to talk to a majority of our members. The process will be continued and improved during the next years.

**Diversification**

For this year IGLYO aimed at growing it`s membership by reaching 3 new organisations that are trans and/or intersex specific and/or part of contexts where the struggle for LGBTQ rights is facing harsh challenges. We exceeded our target by welcoming 4 new trans organisations, one of which is also intersex specific and 2 organizations from Russia.

**OBJECTIVE 3. To achieve social inclusion and positive social change for LGBTQ youth by promoting dialogue between LGBTQ youth and wider society.**

**Intersectionality Workshop at the European Youth Forum, December 2014 (Brussels, Belgium)**

In December we were invited by European Youth Forum to do a workshop on Intersectionality during their Capacity Building seminar on Multiple Discrimination held in Brussels. We were accompanied by Tamas Kadar, Equinet and Gay Moon, Special Legal Adviser UK Equality & Diversity Forum who both focused on anti-discrimination and multiple discrimination.

**Conference “LGBTQI Empowering Realities Challenging Homophobia and Transphobia”, February 2015 (Turin, Italy)**

Eirik Rise attended a conference on LGBTQ peer-to-peer education. The conference was the end of a longer ERASMUS project between five higher educational institutions from Italy, Spain, England, Ireland and Slovenia. The project developed and tried out models for peer education.

**MGRM Seminar on GIGESC, February 2015 (Valletta, Malta)**

Co-chair Mina Tolu attended seminar on Malta’s new law for trans and intersex persons.

**GIGESC Law in Maltese Parliament, April 2015 (Valletta, Malta)**

Co-chair Mina Tolu was present at the the Maltese Parliament for the passing of the GIGESC law.

**6th EU Diversity Charters Annual Forum - ‘Multipliers and actors in diversity management: moving to the next level’, October 2015 (Luxembourg City, Luxembourg)**

Our Advocacy Officer Nitin Sood attended the annual Diversity Charters Forum to ensure that LGBTQI youth concerns are also addressed in the discourse of diversity.

**Meeting & Supporting Member Organisations**

- January 2015: meeting with Charlie (Czech republic) during our project co-ordination meeting in Prague.
- May 2015: meeting with We Are and Gender Liberation (Malta) during our project co-ordination meeting in Malta.
- June 2015: Mina Tolu led a session on gender, sexuality for new member organisation Arcigay Pistoia in Italy.
- June 2015: Eirik Rise met with LGBT Ungdom in Denmark to discuss IDAHOT 2016. In September 2015 LGBT Ungdom held their General Assembly and the dialogue around a youth side event was renewed with the new board.
- June: 2015: Eirik Rise met in Oslo with Maximum from Murmans, Russia, to discuss the youth situation and cooperation. Maximums application for membership was approved at the third Board meeting in Reykjavik.
- August 2015: meeting with Icelandic member organisations Samtokin 78, Trans Island and OII-Island, participation in Iceland Pride, during our project co-ordination meeting.
- August 2015: Mina Tolu co-led a session on LGBTQ basics for We Are in Malta.
- September 2015: Tudor Kovaks led a session for Wel Jong Niet Hetero in Belgium.

### Reaching out to LGBTQ Youth Organisations

- January 2015: Mina Tolu met with the coordinator of IDAHOT Committee/ campaign to discuss youth issues and how these can be focused on within IDAHOT activities, contributing to the working document on IDAHOT on Youth over some months. Thanks to input from delegates at the GA in 2014.
- May 2015: Mina Tolu met with LGBT Centre IdF in Paris, and spoke to them about their events and current situation of organisations in Paris.
- June 2015: Mina Tolu talked about IGLYO at a training organised by Giosef Unito in Torino,, also meeting members of Arcigay Torino, who coordinate a peer2peer helpline for LGBTQ young people in the Italian city.
